The committee meets monthly, and its' purpose is to examine current FCPS practices regarding the communication/dissemination of information to parents related to supports and services provided to students with disabilities; and to make recommendations designed to improve and strengthen the relationship between parents of students with disabilities and FCPS school staff and central office staff.
